

This afternoon there was held the faculty meeting to consider the candidates for Subdiaconate, to be ordained on June 5 next, and the name of Mr. ROBERT WHITE came up for special consideration and discussion. I thought it better to present the pertinent information to now by letter, and later at your convenience to discuss it personally or by telephone.

In brief, the recommendation of the faculty is that Mr. White be told in the very near future that his being advanced to Major Orders will depend upon his making noticeable improvement in his studies during the remainder of the second semester. There is also a medical or health angle to consider in his case, which will be explained below.

With regard to his studies, it is already known to from the report cards that Mr. White received a mark of D in both Scripture and Dogma.

The Scripture professor says that Mr. White is slow, but that he does get the minimum, and that he is not marked by "anything egregious" so far as the Scripture class results are concerned. In view of the fact that five other theologians received a mark of D from the same professor, and in view of his comments upon the student, I do not think that the situation is serious so far as Mr. White and Sacred Scripture are concerned.

The story in Dogma is a different one. This professor gave only two D's, the other one going to the Filipino student. And he says that he has told Mr. White that he received a D for this semester only per misericordiam. The student was informed that he received a break this time, and the same results in class work next semester will merit for him an F in Dogma.

The consensus seems to be that, as the Scripture professor said, Mr. White is slow, but he has the necessary minimum scholastically. Yet, he is falling below what he should be accomplishing in class. It is suspected that two reasons are behind this.

It has become more noticeable that Mr. White gets involved in various extra-curricular activities. He will be making placards, or making a tape recording for some student activity, doing this and doing that, with no small part of his outside work being devoted to various projects having to do with Camp St. Malo, where he is quite valuable as a counselor. There is reason to think, therefore, that Mr. White may be spending so much time on other things that he is neglecting his studies.

Secondly, he has recently been to the doctor because of feeling tired or run down. The infirmarian mentioned to me several days ago that this had occurred, so I undertook to make inquiry of the before the faculty meeting.

The doctor verified the visit to his office, and said that he had made a number of tests, the effect of which was the verdict that there does not appear to be anything physically wrong. The chest X-ray was satisfactory, and various tests for diabetes, etc., were made and proved to be negative.

However, the doctor also wished to have a test made to check on a possible thyroid deficiency, which could lead to a tired and run-down feeling, but Mr. White has not yet returned to see him or arranged for this further test.

Before knowing of these medical developments, both and I had wondered if Mr. White were not taking time off without any real need or reason for doing so. He was in bed a total of six days during the first semester, at different times, a number equaled only by a student who had serious trouble after a tooth extraction. Supposedly a sinus condition was causing this, at least to some extent, although the has no record of Mr. White's reporting to him any notable sinus problem.

I asked to keep special note of these things in Mr. White's case, with a view to stirring him up, if he were taking it easy by means of a day's rest now and then, and telling him that in a parish the pastor and people must be able to rely on a priest's appearing for Mass and other functions, even when he does not feel too well in the morning. As was mentioned above, there has been a suspicion that Mr. White's indispositions have not been so grave as to require his remaining in bed.

Considering both the scholastic and the health aspects of the case, therefore, with the professors having in mind principally the class work, and myself giving weight to the health angle, we respectfully propose the following procedure to the health angle, we respectfully propose the following procedure to the health angle.

Instead of approving him, like the other members of the class, for promotion to Subdiaconate and Diaconate, the faculty voted unanimously to "wait and see." That is, the faculty recommends Mr. White's being told that he will have to prove, during the balance of the current semester, by improving his class work, that he is capable of getting a passing grade in

all of his subjects, and especially that he must do well enough to pass in Dogma. In connection with this, detailed information should be obtained concerning the variety of extra-curricular activities in which Mr. White engages and the amount of time consumed by them. It is not that any one of these things is so important or time-consuming in itself, but we fear that the accumulation of them has become too great.

I would plan at the same time to question him about the state of his health, and to tell him that he should return to for completion of the tests that were supposed to be made, in order that any thyroid imbalance (if such be present) can be corrected by medication. We have had one or two others here who were straightened out and who improved in their work after taking pills for a couple of months. Once the pills do their work, they can be discontinued, it seems.

Discussion of Mr. White's health would allow me to stress for him the importance of a priest's being ready and on hand every day to take care of the people, and, I believe, to correct any mistaken notion that Mr. White might have in this regard.

Before concluding, I should offer to the assurance that the faculty in general expects Mr. White to qualify both for approval for the Subdiaconate, and for the other orders at the proper time. While not unduly bright, he is a hard worker, is ready to do what he is asked and to do it well, and should be a useful parish priest. He has a pleasing personality, and I am sure will do well among the people.

But it looks as if he has let other things take precedence over his studies, and he may be yielding to an inclination to take a day off once in a while, when there is no real need and when he cannot afford to be missing classes.

This is a lengthy statement concerning Mr. White, but I believe that would wish to have a complete report on the situation as it stands, and to receive it in this manner, which allows time for consideration of the matter. If I do not have opportunity to speak to before Holy Thursday morning at the cathedral, since this will be one of your busiest weeks, perhaps you would wish to indicate to me at that time if the procedure proposed here meets with your approval. Should that be so, there will be time for me on Thursday to tell Mr. White what he is expected to do, and for him to arrange for completion of the medical tests before classes are resumed after Easter. I honestly feel that all will end well here, and that it will be for Mr. White's own good and for the good of his future work in the archdiocese that he be given this reminder that first things must come first, and that he be on hand to do what has to be done, even at the cost of some slight discomfort occasionally.





I have been asked by the members of Squadron 13, of the Civil Air Patrol, which is the Squadron for the North Denver district and which meets at North High School, to be their Squadron Chaplain.

I have inquired into the duties and obligations of a Civil air Patrol Chaplain and found;

- 1. that the Civil Air Patrol is a volunteer organization and an auxiliary of the United States Air Force.
- 2. that its membership, asside from assigned Air Force personnel, consists entirely of unpaid civilian volunteers with their own officers and chain of command.
- 3. that the Civil Air Patrol Chaplain, by reason of His membership in the Civil Air Patrol, is no more liable to call to active military duty than he was prior to his appointment as a CAP Chaplain.
- 4. I have spoken with and Squadron 13's Commander and learned from him what the duties of thier Squadron Chaplain would be. Basically it is to assist home and Church in moral and citizenship training of the CAP Cadets, who are boys and girls, between the ages of 14 and 18. This is accomplished through the lectures which the CAP Chaplain must give and which the Cadets need in order to earn their Certificate of Proficiency. Squadron 13 meets every Monday evening, and it would be necessary for me to attend only one and at the most two meetings a month, this I could work quite easily into my weekly and monthly schedual.

This money would be used for the purpose of purchasing a house to be used as a Newman Center on the College Campus. I am inclosing a fact sheet from the Realitor concerning this property. Again I realize this is a sizeable amount but I believe at this time, that it would be a good investment.

....

The property ones purchased would be self-supporting. The basement is rented out and brings in a good income. This would provide sufficient funds for taking care of the maintance of the house and also provide the Newman Apostolate here with an income.

At the present time there is absolutely no sourse of income from the students at the college. There is no way to provide them with a Sunday Mass on the C mpus or here at the Parish, which could provide some sort of an income. Also since it is a Junior College and of small inrollment 1700, there are only a few C tholic students, about 300. And most of these either go home, out of Stirling, or already attend St. Anthony's as parishoners.

The only other initial expence that I could possibly forsee would be the purchase of some furniture and clerical supplies. The house is in good shape and needs no repairs or renovations. I mentioned to you before about my living at the house. As far as I can tell this would in no way interfere with my duties here at St. Anthony's. And in a way I feel it would be a necessity, due to the fact that the basement of the house is being rented out.

There are other alternitives, other houses in the area, perhaps just getting a large house trailer, this type of thing, but all lack the one thing which I feel is most important in the above mentioned house, an almost guarenteed sourse of income.

I humbly submit this request to you and the committee you have formed for your consideration.



Dear Estate :

About three weeks ago I wrote two letters to you, one in regard to the Newman Apostolate here at Northeastern Junior College and the other in regard to a personal matter of where I would like to be stationed.

I did not mail either of these letters because I thought I might be able to see you on Friday the 17th of November. However, when I did call that Friday suggested I write another letter to you. One thing led to another and I'm just now getting around to writting that letter.

What I wanted to tell you, is in regard to the Newman Apostolate and the request for funds. I don't know now whether this can even be presented to your committee for consideration in next years budget, but I'm sending it on any way. I began to wonder if this wasn't merely a purely selfish desire on my part, that is to have a Newman House, to be able to get away from the rectory, to perhaps be more on my own. When this idea first came up I thought it was great and many ugged me to make the request for funds to get a place and establish a Center, and those I talked to at that time are all still very much enthusiastic about the idea. Right now I'm just confused and slightly discouraged I think. I've tried to make this my principal interest as your letter of appointment stated. But I have found it next to impossible to get to the students by just being out or around the Campus. There's no one place where they will know to find me, there were no definite times I could establish for being there and being available to them. Having a Center seemed to be a way of making myself more abailable to them.

Another problem keeps bothering me. At times I would like very much to request a change of appointment, it just seems that there are certain things and I just can't communicate on, I try to understand him and also keep reminding myself what you told me when I first mentioned this to you. This is one reason I felt I was being purely selfish in requesting and wanting to have a Newman Center, a house where I could live away. And I feel one reason I did not mail the request sooner, is I felt like asking to be moved. The thought also accured to me that I might be able to work very well this way, but what about the future, if I'm moved, would the new assistant want to live in a separate house, would the new Newman Chaplain want to run the Apostolate from such a Center?

Well, if anything, you can tell I'm confused, but also concerned. As for the request for funds for the Newman Center I'm sending this on to you, leaving that decision to you and the committee. As for being Moved, or requesting a transfer, there are just certain times that I would like to do this, they come and go and for the most part the work gets done and we live in great harmony.

If you really didn't understand to what I was referring, I think it's time you did know.

The priest who worried the parents of teen-age boys was Father Robert White. These were the things that bothered them, as reported to me: In religion classes in the school he ignored the girls. It's said he never even bothered to learn their names, though he traught them every week. He favored the boys over the girls, which naturally bothered the girls parents. He had favorites among the boys. He allowed them to choose which boys were to be invited on the ski trios, trips to Denver, to his mountain cabin, flying, etc. The less favored boys resorted to bribery in order to be chosen, and the parents certainly took a dim view of that. His religion classes were, in one parent's words, "Just a constant popularity contest".

On these trios under-age boys were allowed to drive his car on the highway, and drinking beer en route was the usual custom, even for pre-teens. While perhaps not immoral, these actions are cettainly illegal and a poor example. On one occasion, the older sister of one of the boys, angry with always being left out, insisted on being included on a ski trip. She later told her mother that he showed no respect for the fact that she was present, and continued to tell dirty jokes to the boys, which embarrassed her. (She is the oldest in a large, very frank, family, and does not embarrass easily.)


One night he was to help chaperone a CCD dance. He arrived late, piled as many boys (always in snort supply at a dance) as he could fit into his Mustang, and took them off to see "Romep and Juliet". The young married couple also chaperoning the dance were disturbed for a number of reasons: Fr. White was not chaperoning the dance as he had agreed to do; perhaps the parents did not want their boys to see this film because of the nudity; and, when parents think their children are one place, they shouldn't be taken anywhere else without the parents' knowledge and permission.

But most disturbing of all was his sitting with a boy in his lab. This was observed on two separate occasions: once at a dance and the other time in the back of a CCD classroom while a lay man and woman were trying to teach a class.

I myself did not witness any of these incidents, but the people who did came to my husband and me for advice on what, if anything, should be done about it. Why us? Perhaps because we are both considered to be level-headed and was at the time. They felt that someone should know, but hesitated to talk to talk to I informed him of the lap-sitting incidents, and no further incidents were reported to me. Later, the mother of the girl mentioned above also takked to and was given to understand there had been similar incidents at Fr. White's previous parish.

If you want the names of those who came to us, I will give them to you with their permission. I debated calling them to double-check their stories before writing this, but decided it would do more harm than good to revive a dead (for us here) it would know them all personally and haven't the slightest reason to doubt anything they told me.

As for reputations suffering, there seems to be little chance of that. I have never heard Fr. White's activities even alluded to outside the very small group of parents and lay teachers directly concerned, except once: Coming back from lay teachers directly concerned, except once: Coming back from lay teachers directly concerned, except once: Coming back from lay teachers directly concerned, except once: Coming back from lay teachers directly not were discussing current movies. We had just gotten to the question "How do you know which ones we had just gotten to the question "How do you know which ones to let your children see?". One mother commented, "My son to let your children see?". One mother commented, "My son asked me if he could see a certain X-rated film and I told him, 'Certainly not:' Then he laughed in an embarrassed way and 'Certainly not:' Then he laughed in an embarrassed way and said, 'Fr. White took us toosee it in Ft. Collins last week.'" If you can believe it with five women, the conversation stopped dead; it just isn't the sort of thing anybody wants to talk about. However, we've no reason to believe the same things are not going on now in Vail, and therefore you should know.



I hope you can understand why I wrote last week that after our experiences here, a happily married priest would be a welcome relief. You can hardly blame us for looking at each new priest and wondering, "What's his problem?".

Wednesday, April 28

I showed the above to the young couple who had chaperoned the dance; the wife is also the CCD teacher in whose class Fr. White had held the boy in his lap. I do feel in a rather sticky position reporting things I didn't see myself, so I asked them to read it for accuracy. They read it separately but both had the same reaction: when they got to the last line above, they each laughed and said, "That is so true!" They approved it for accuracy and urged me to mail it before I "chickened out". But I've done a lot of thinking since then, and I have a few more things to add:

You wrote that my comments disturbed you; yours disturbed me just as much. We know that was aware of was aware of 's and White's problems, yet you seem to be unaware of those problems and the ones we are having right now. Doesn't anybody tell you anything? Don't you know what's going on? How did priests like and White get ordained in the first place? (We know that was before you came.) Was it because no one would say anything to anyone in authority? It really scares me. Until this weekend, I'd been thinking of sending our boys to Camp St. Malo this summer. But now I'm afraid

they'd meets up with a future Fr. White. Who's to prevent it, if everyone maintains a discreet silence?

(I don't expect you to answer these questions, but I do hope you'll think about them.)

Do so many bishops continue to support enforced celibacy simply because they don't know what's happening? The priests admit it's a real problem - either for them personally or for their colleagues. The lay people don't care whether their their colleagues. The lay people don't care whether their priests are married or not, as long as they do the job. Please priests are married or not, as long as they do the job. Please don't misunderstand; we think that voluntary celibacy is a beautiful gift. But involuntary celibacy, from what see here, brings us nothing but problems.

Celibacy also gives us problems with priests who have no desire to ma rry. You've seen our rectory since it was remodeled and redecorated; did you get a complete tour, including the two-room bathroom? I did, and found out the word "scandalited" is not obsolete. Some boys, after a tour, and well aware that in addition to his luxurious living quarters Fr. White also had cameras, skis, stereos, a sporty car, camper truck, also had cameras, skis, stereos, a sporty car, camper truck, motorcycle, snowmobile, airplane, and mountain cabin, decided that being a priest looked like a pretty soft life, and perhaps they should go in for it, too. When I remarked to a friend they should go in for it, too. When I remarked to a friend that I certainly wouldn't want my sons to enter the priesthood that I certainly wouldn't want my sons to enter the priesthood for those reasons, she replied, "Silly, that's just their substitute for a wife and children." We'd rather they had the wife and children. Then they couldn't afford their luxurious life-style, and their sermons on the virtues of Christian powerty and sacrifice would be a lot more convincing. Now, they only elicit smiles.

I hope you won't take that as criticism of the priests.
My criticism is aimed at the system which results in such a
huge "credibility gap" between what they preach and how they
live.

We suspect that is why they build us churches much more magnificent than we need, desire, or can afford. And it that explains the lack of support here for the annual ADF campaigns.







All I know, is that in almost every respect, it is going to be difficult. All of us have already experienced form other priesst, the cyclnism, the distrust some times an anger about the whole thing. We experieded the mind set of varrious priests who are not open and who will not open themselvevs to new ways of thinking and looking and experiencing the Church. There are those I've experienced who say they've kept up and read and know whats going on yet are still thinking and acting as if they ha ven't heard or read or seen a thing. I'd like to share what I've experienced here with my brother priests in the Archdioceses, but it scares me to even th ink about it somethmes. I've seen how vehement and condemenatory some very well meaning Priests can get. So I'll put it this way. I'll do my best to do what I can to help promote this type of experience for the priests of the Archdioceses, although I feel like its signing up for the martyers lists in the arena. Nobody ever liked facing the lyons all alone.

As for the Parish, I just have a few goals in mind that I'm going to try to work out with the people and feel we can have accomplished them by January of76. of Chicago on Liturgy was really great and I know that what I learned from him and what I experienced every day here will be of infinite benefit in my parish liturgys.

Well this short little note got a little long. but the rest of us did this this morning for the area directors of continuing education and the Board of Directors of the Institute, so thought you should get the good news too. I would say if you were here of the twenty eight guys here you would have heard twenty seven very positive and glowing reports on the Institute. Only one, who is haveing tremendous personal difficulties and is a classic case of extreem scrupulosoty. Just came: out and told us all he thought the whole thing was a waste of time, all the tried and true doctrines of the Church had been dinyed here and he was going to write a book and refute the whole thing, so that's the other side of the story too.

I'll be back to Minturn on the 20 of Dec. and back in Denver, stoping at my folks house, 433-7096, if you want to get in touch with me, on the 18 or 19. We, believe it or not graduated this morning. Now I have to pack for the journs home. I'm returning by way of L.A. either pheonix of Las Vegas, Alberqurque the Denver.

I would like to share with you our present situation concerning the parish property here in it. Patrick's Parish. Also, I would appreciate your sending someone from the Chancery Office who understands such matters to help me and give us direction in purchasing and selling property, and obtaining funds to build new structures. It will be and obtaining funds to build new structures. It will be greatly appreciated if that person could get in touch with me quickly so that we might be able to set up a mutually acceptable time to meet.

Following is a current summary of our property holdings.

In Eagle we have one lot on which St. Mary's Church is located, and one or two lots right next to the church on the corner. The church is old, wood, small (70 capacity), heated with oil floor furnaces, has no water or sewer connections, is not insulated, and has a small meeting room in the rear.

In Red Cliff we have one lot on which Mt. Carmel Church is located. It, too, is a small wood structure, not insulated, heated by a natural gas overhead heater, has no water or sewer connections, and has a capacity of about 100. The lot is on a hill with precarious parking for one or two cars.

One other lot in Red Cliff is under our ownership. It is about 25 ft. wide and perhaps 100 ft. long. There's a problem here. Some time ago, ten years or more, let the town put part of a playground on part of the lot, and another person planted grass on the remainder of the lot. I feel this should be corrected as soon as postible, either by selling the lot to the town or the neighbor, or by simply getting everyone else off it. There is no way we could build anything on it, but there are possibilities of selling this lot and purchasing other property

In Minturn we have the lot on which the rectory and garage are located, St. Patrick's Church, and the lot on which it is located. The rectory is in top shape at the present time, and should be adequate for many years to come. The church is very small for the area with a capacity of about 120. It has water and sewer connections, is heated by a gas furnace, has a small basement at one end, and an underground water problem during the spring and summer. This ground water problem during the spring and had to have the enpast year we insulated the ceiling and had to have the entre building rewired. It needs a new roof, but after two years we have found it impossible to find anyone to do the job. We really need a larger, more versatile building.

There is some other property in Minturn consisting of one full lot and a portion of another lot next to it. Some-how or other, is the owner of about 1/3 of the lot. His portion has a small garage on it, and he is asking about \$3,000 or more for it. This is and has been a big problem for me, and I do hope we can get the situation cleared up as soon as possible. These two lots would not be big enough to build on, and there is the prob-would not be big enough to build on, and there is the problem of parking. I believe there is some available land right outside town within the city limits. This land is owned by the location for a church.

Finally, I think we must look ahead. The proposed growth patterns of the county are almost unbelievable. We might be too late already. There will be great growth in Minturn, Eagle-Vail, Avon-Beaver Creek, Vail, Edwards, Wolturn, Eagle-Vail, Avon-Beaver Creek, Vail, Edwards, Wolturn, and Eagle. I feel we should be obtaining good procept, and Eagle. I feel we should be obtaining good property sites for these areas, taking into account these are not big city parishes, and will not be needing room for schools or a lot of parking.

In regards to Vail, presently there is a proposal to put a small addition on the Interfaith Chapel. The growth proposed for this area will be significant, and perhaps in another ten years something else will have to be done. The areas we are considering include East Vail, Vail, and The areas we are considering include East Vail, vail, and West Vail, with a proposed 1985 population of about 30,000.
